<p>Pupil Premium strategy statement</p> <p>We have used our Pupil Premium funding to support pupils in reading, writing and maths as well as attendance. We have seen a particular improvement in Mathematical attainment this year and a greater number of pupils achieving Greater Depth than previously. This is largely due to a new approach across the whole school with a strong focus on mastery and all pupils working to the same learning objective, with some additional challenge for quick graspers and the more able. Through fluid groups and pre and post teaching we have been able to ensure that pupils keep up and have a deeper understanding of key concepts. This is helping us to reduce gaps between pupil premium pupils and their peers.</p> <p>In writing pupils have made progress using editing and a greater emphasis on pupils taking greater responsibility for checking their own work. We still have work to do as a school on spelling and our local dialect makes grammar a great challenge for some pupils. We still need to see more pupils achieving Greater Depth standard at the end of key stage 2. Pre and post teaches and interventions have been used effectively to support pupils needing extra help. Reading is an area where historically we have done very well. However, this year our key stage 2 result was disappointing and this is an area that requires our attention. It is due in part to the demands made on readers from the volume of text in SATs papers and this means we must ensure pupils are fluent readers and can use inference and deduction skills to fully comprehend texts. Reading and writing are areas of significant challenge for some pupils in receipt of Pupil Premium, especially when they also have a specific difficulty such as dyslexia. In addition we are still slightly higher than national average for persistent average and this year we have made a change in this area to ensure that pupils' education is not damaged by days being lost from school unnecessarily. Attendance case conferences and home visits have been helpful in making improvements for some children but for some this has not been sufficient and we need a more robust approach.</p>
